There is a considerable amount of information to research in order to obtain a complete understanding of the revised Commission on Dental Accreditation (CODA) Dental Hygiene standards and the proposed CODA Dental Assisting standards. This issue of our newsletter has been written in a format that will bullet important points to expedite your thorough investigation of all the details. At the February 3rd, 2012 meeting of CODA, four agenda items adopted/approved are of greatest concern to Dental Assisting and Dental Hygiene program educators and administrators:

New Ethics & Professionalism Standard This new standard applies to disciplines of dental and allied dental programs. Specific details are written accordingly for each discipline. The DH Standard 2-22 has already been added to the revised standards and the DA Standard is numbered 2-20 in the proposed revisions.

Graduates must be competent in the application of the principles of ethical reasoning, ethical decision making and professional responsibility as they pertain to the academic environment, research, patient care and practice management.

DA Standard 2-20



DA & DH Accreditation Update

How Will Programs Demonstrate Compliance with The New Ethics Standard?

The curriculum and all clinical experiences will need to include opportunities for students to apply ethical reasoning and problem solving as it pertains to each course subject and the delivery of patient care.

Here is an example of some documents that can be included as exhibits showing how the program meets the standard utilizing a consistent code of ethics:

- policy manuals for program, clinic etc. that address ethics and professionalism expectations in the program
- individual course syllabi that include learning outcomes that measure the students ability to apply ethical reasoning through course requirements and learning activities
- a formal ethics course as part of the curriculum
- a clinical evaluation system that utilizes an ongoing process evaluation of student knowledge and performance of ethical behaviors and reasoning
- outcomes assessment tools that measure students knowledge and performance of ethical reasoning and professionalism i.e. results from surveys of students, patients, graduates, and employers
- Faculty, student memberships in professional organizations such as ADA, AADA, ADEA, etc.

Revised CODA Dental Hygiene Standards

The following standards have had revisions: 2-16, 2-17, 2-19, 2-22(new) 2-25, 3-3, 3-7, 4-3, 4-5, 4-7. Those with major changes (not simple word changes) are addressed here to provide a brief understanding of how the changes will impact the program. Existing standards or parts of standards are in **Bold**, additions are in **Red**

Standard 2-16 Graduates must be competent in providing dental hygiene care for the child, adolescent, adult and geriatric patient. Graduates must be competent in assessing the treatment needs of patients with special needs.

The revision to this standard is one line added to:

Examples of evidence to demonstrate compliance may include:

 Student clinical evaluation mechanism demonstrating student competence in clinical skills, communication and practice management

Preparations or changes to make for this revision:

Review grading/competency forms to ascertain that they include items that require the instructor to evaluate all aspects of each clinical skill and especially the student's ability to communicate with patients in accordance with their individual needs, i.e. gender, age, medical, psychological or physical disabilities; and application of evidence based patient centered care in each instance.

Grading methods should be objective and comprehensive with regard to evaluating students as they interact with patients with special needs to determine if proper communication occurs at the time care is given.

Standard 2-17 Graduates must be competent in providing the dental hygiene process of care which includes:

- a) comprehensive collection of patient data to identify the physical and oral health status;
- b) analysis of assessment findings and use of critical thinking in order to address the patient's dental hygiene treatment needs:
- c) establishment of a dental hygiene care plan that reflects the realistic goals and treatment strategies to facilitate optimal oral health;
- d) provision of patient-centered treatment and evidencebased care in a manner minimizing risk and optimizing oral health:
- e) measurement of the extent to which goals identified in the dental hygiene care plan are achieved;
- f) complete and accurate recording of all documentation relevant to patient care.

The revision to this standard is one line added to the existing: **Examples of Evidence to demonstrate compliance:**

Use of risk assessment systems and/or forms to develop a dental hygiene care plan

Preparations or changes to make for this revision:

Review clinic forms or computerized patient record systems and if necessary, revise to include a comprehensive medical/dental patient evaluation and a sequential guide that helps the student arrive at an accurate dental hygiene diagnosis. A suggestion for developing the patient centered evidence based care plan could be a decision making tree or flow chart. Include other tools such as rubrics or questionnaires that require the student to apply appropriate judgment and decision making for the plan.

Standard 2-19 Graduates must be competent in interpersonal and communication skills to effectively interact with diverse population groups and other members of the health care team

Preparations or changes to make for this revision:

Some ideas: Research the opportunities in your institution and community for students to team up with other health care providers. Other students in health care programs in your institution such as Nursing, Emergency Medical Technicians, or Medical Laboratory Science could team up with dental hygiene students on projects such as health fairs, planning for emergency response in your clinic or use of patient simulators in their departments. Medical laboratory or microbiology students can team up with dental hygiene students on projects involving microbiology as it relates to dental diseases or clinic settings. DH students can team up with nurses and physicians in public health facilities where they will be exposed to a team approach to patient care with patients of various ethnic, socioeconomic levels and/or disabilities. In your accreditation self-study document, you will be required to demonstrate that all students have equal opportunities for exposure to this type of learning situation. Affiliation agreements are legal requirements for some of these partnerships. Formal lesson plans, with project descriptions and learning outcomes help demonstrate compliance with this standard.

Standard 2-25 is now Standard 2-26 Graduates must be competent in problem solving strategies related to comprehensive patient care and management of patients.

Intent:

Critical thinking and decision making skills are necessary to provide effective and efficient dental hygiene services. Throughout the curriculum, the educational program should use teaching and learning methods that support the development of critical thinking and problem solving skills.

Examples of evidence to demonstrate compliance may include:

- · evaluation mechanisms designed to monitor knowledge and performance;
- outcomes assessment mechanisms demonstrating application of critical thinking skills;
- activities or projects that demonstrate student experiences with analysis of problems related to comprehensive patient care;
- demonstration of the use of active learning methods that promote critical appraisal of scientific evidence in combination with clinical application and patient factors.

Preparations or changes to make for this revision:

Review the entire curriculum to investigate the need to limit teaching, learning and testing methods of fundamental styles of memorizing and recognizing and transition to critical thinking and decision making methodologies. Faculty workshops with your own institution's teaching center can assist with the process. In-services and continuing education in educational methodology workshops are beneficial for revamping individual instructor's teaching methods in specific subjects they are teaching.

The remaining revisions to standards are self-explanatory, but the two listed here are noteworthy:

Standard 3-3 The program administrator must be a dental hygienist who is a graduate of a program accredited by the Commission on Dental Accreditation and possesses a masters or higher degree or is currently enrolled in a masters or higher degree program or a dentist who has background in education and the professional experience necessary to understand and fulfill the program goals.

3-7 The full time faculty of a dental hygiene program must possess a baccalaureate or higher degree.

Faculty providing didactic instruction must have earned at least a baccalaureate degree or be currently enrolled in a baccalaureate degree program. All dental hygiene program faculty members must have current knowledge of the specific subjects they are teaching. All program faculty must have documented background in educational methodology consistent with teaching assignments. Faculty who are dental hygienists must be graduates of dental hygiene programs accredited by the Commission on Dental Accreditation.



Here is the statement from the ADACODA website on circulation of the proposed revised standards for Dental Assisting Programs:

"At its February 3, 2012 meeting, the Commission directed that the proposed revised Accreditation Standards for Dental Assisting Education Programs be circulated for comment among the communities of interest for a period of one year. An open hearing will be held at the American Dental Education Association (ADEA) Annual Session, March 2012 in Orlando, FI; at the ADEA Allied Program Direc- • tors Conference, June 2012 in Chicago, IL; and at the American Dental Association Annual Session, October 2012 in San Francisco, CA. Public comments can also be submitted to the Commission on Dental Accreditation, 211 E. Chicago Ave., Suite 1900, Chicago, IL 60611"

When the revisions to the CODA Dental Assisting Standards have been approved, each standard will be addressed in the issue of this newsletter that immediately follows the commission's meeting.

The proposed revisions are numerous and extensive. An overall review of the document revised DH Standards and the proposed DA reveals that changes proposed are closely aligned with Dental Hygiene standards in the sections of program planning with well defined program goals and outcomes assessments. The proposed revisions would, if approved, impose major changes on the curriculum content and design and also on the clinical experiences with regard to student skill development, and stringent grading of clinical competencies.

CODA has accepted new rules in the application for initial accreditation of a new dental hygiene program. Now a formal needs assessment will be mandatory to apply for initial accreditation. This ruling will go into effect on January I, 2013. The Dental Hygiene job market is saturated in most areas and stopping the proliferation of new programs will help secure the future for the profession.
